Mr. Pedersen reviewed and states that there will be 15 parcels in this neighborhood that are still not within the City limits. 2nd Reading Ordinance 2018-30 An ordinance to amend Section 1407.C of the Zoning Ordinance to add health uses in the LM (Limited Manufacturing) Zone. Mr. Pedersen states that the VA Medical Clinic is currently operating as a non-conforming grandfather use. Carol Coleman states that amendment does not include substance abuse clinics

Councilman Lowder states the homeless work themselves out of being homeless, it is the same people that stay homeless, they stay here because of what is offered to them here, most of them choose to live that lifestyle, we have not to this day reduced the homelessness in this city.

Councilman Render states that this frees up judicial time, encourages other council to give a shot

Councilwoman Vereen expresses that let's try and review after two years.

Councilman Chestnut states that it is just another spoke in the wheel, gives the needy an option to actually receive the help they need, sometimes all they need is to be able to get back home.
