CITY OF MYRTLE BEACH COUNTY OF HORRY STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA DECLARING MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND AN EXTRAORDINARY EVENT AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO TAKE ALL STEPS NECESSARY FOR THE PRESERVATION OF PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY AND WELFARE.

WHEREAS, the City of Myrtle Beach is responsible for the safety and well-being of its residents and visitors, and the security of its homes and its businesses, especially during extraordinary events, which would be special events if managed and permitted, but through which, by their unorganized attendance, congestion, and sometimes unlawful behavior, could threaten the peace and welfare of individuals, businesses and the community at large; and

WHEREAS, activity observed the previous weekend created a public safety danger and provides reason to believe that such behavior will continue and will continue to create a threat to public safety. Video recordings show public disorder and raise particular safety concerns related to the use of golf carts and mopeds; and

WHEREAS, large crowds on Ocean Boulevard exhibited a disregard for traffic safety laws as well as social distancing guidelines necessitated by the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the state of South Carolina is still under a state of emergency related to COVID-19 which the governor renewed as recently as May 12, 2020. At that time, the governor recognized the need to take extraordinary measures "to meet the unprecedented threat posed by COVID-19 and the evolving nature and scope of this public health emergency;" and

WHEREAS, a state of civil emergency also exists in the City of Myrtle Beach which declaration was recently renewed by Mayor Brenda Bethune on May 12, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the public safety and public health risks will be magnified during the upcoming weekend by a greater number of visitors expected to arrive for the holiday weekend; and

WHEREAS, the city's emergency personnel, including Police, Fire, EMS, Parks and Public Works staff, are put in harm's way due to the number of visitors occupying the area in and around Ocean Boulevard and the behavior of those visitors. This risk of harm is compounded by the risk of contracting the coronavirus; and

WHEREAS, the capacity of public spaces, including streets and sidewalks, also is limited, and the number of visitors expected this holiday weekend can exceed that capacity in

many locations, preventing a timely response to emergencies in which lives are at stake; and

WHEREAS, the City's ability to manage the crowd and the associated demand on city resources will be further compromised because cooperating agencies that historically offer assistance to the City are unable to offer assistance this year due to budget cuts, furloughs and continued health concerns related to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the increased number of visitors is expected to overwhelm the community and its resources by engendering disorder on the public streets and rights-of-way, by placing extreme burdens on the City's law enforcement, fire protection, emergency services, traffic management, and other public services, and by causing residents and visitors to fear for their health and safety; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND DECLARED that the Memorial Day Weekend commencing Friday, May 22, 2020 at 12:01 a.m. and concluding Monday, May 25, 2020 at 11:59 p.m. is an extraordinary event due to its anticipated impact.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Manager, or designee(s), is vested with the full authority enumerated in Division 6 of Chapter 19 of the Myrtle Beach Code of Ordinances and is directed to exercise such authority as necessary to promote public health, safety, welfare and order, and to protect lives, minimize criminal activity, and maximize the efficiency of providing municipal services;

IT IS FURTHER RECOGNIZED that, in light of the current state of emergency, the City Manager is vested with additional authority pursuant to Chapter 8 of the Myrtle Beach Code of Ordinances.

Further, the violation of any provision of this division, or in any rule, regulation, order or traffic device or restriction promulgated by any officer or agency of the city under authority duly vested in him is declared to be unlawful as a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$500.00 or by imprisonment for a term not exceeding 30 days or both, in the discretion of the judge of the municipal court. Each incident of violation, rather than each day of violations, of any provision of this Code or of any such ordinance, resolution, rule, regulation or order shall continue shall constitute a separate offense.

Further, while any person who violates any provision of the Code may be issued a warning, citation or notice that the person is in violation of the Code within the discretion of law enforcement, and while any penalty for conviction of a violation lies solely within the discretion of the court, it is the will of City Council that the protection and preservation of the public health, safety and welfare of the public and first responders be paramount, and that enforcement of the imposed restrictions herein be made immediately effective so that the violations shall cease, and public peace and order be maintained.
